

California Drought Continues

The drought in California continues to worsen as we experience the driest year ever recorded in our state.

60% of California was in the second most serious category, Extreme Drought, or worse, by the first week of June. During that same time, 31% of Kern county was also in Extreme Drought, with the remaining 69% in the worse category: Exceptional Drought.

Over the last few months, RCSD directors have brought reports of the Antelope Valley East Kern Water Agency only receiving a fraction of their water allocation from the state. This is forcing

some water agencies to seek alternative sources of water. RCSD staff has worked hard at developing secure water supplies for our community that ensures we will continue to have access to the safe and healthy water upon which our community depends.

That said, it is vital for all of us to do our part in using water efficiently. We encourage our customers to examine how they use water and find ways to cut water waste. Often these small changes can add up to big water savings, which also mean savings on your monthly water bill.

We will continue to provide easy ways to conserve water through more efficient use in each newsletter and on our website. Together we can do our part to get through this historic drought.

Turn That Green Lawn into Green Dollars

The Antelope Valley Resource
Conservation District continues to
pay eligible applicants cash money for
removing their high-water use lawns.
This program pays \$1 per square foot
of living lawn removed. It also offers
landscape design assistance and even
free plants. The program is limited,
with payouts made on a first-come,
first-serve basis to eligible applicants,
